The course «History of international relations» covers issues related to the the origin and development of the system of international relations, the main stages of the development of international relations from the ancient world to the end of the 20th century, peculiarities of the diplomatic activity of the countries of the world and the main directions of their foreign policy.

2. Goal and tasks of the academic component

The *purpose* of the course is to study origin and development of international relations, the foreign policy of the states of the world and its evolution in different historical eras, as well as the main trends in the development of interstate relations..

The *main tasks* of the course are the study and analysis of factors, evolution and dynamics of international relations development, foreign policy positions and priorities of the main subjects of international relations at different stages of their development.

In this case, the final semester mark is defined as the sum of the current semester control and exam mark.
