III. DESCRIPTION OF THE ACADEMIC COMPONENT

1. Abstract

The syllabus of the academic component «Conflictology and Theory of Negotiations» is compiled in accordance with the educational and professional program «International Information and Public Communications» of bachelor's training in the specialty 291 International Relations, Public Communications and Regional Studies.

Pre-requisites and post-requisites: Theory of International Relations, International Relations and World Politics, Foreign Policy of Ukraine and National Interests, Strategies of Peace and International Security.

2. Goal and tasks of the academic component (AC)

The goal of teaching the academic component «Conflictology and Theory of Negotiations» is to master the system of knowledge about conflict and conflict interaction, to develop the skills to diagnose, predict and control a conflict situation, to master the practical skills of conflict resolution at various levels and to overcome their destructive consequences, to familiarize with the main technologies of the negotiation process .

The main tasks of the academic component «Conflictology and Theory of Negotiations»:

- clarification of the essence and functions of the conflict;

- disclosure of the main historical stages of research and assessment of conflicts;

- coverage of key theoretical approaches to the study of conflicts;

- clarifying the structure and dynamics of the conflict;

- analysis of the causes and means of conflict resolution;

- study of the main states of conflict management;

- application of effective structural methods and styles of conflict resolution in accordance with a specific situation;

- analysis of negotiations as a way of resolving conflicts and revealing the essence of mediation in the negotiation process.

3. Learning outcomes (Competencies)
